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PREFACE

In the statistics of its mobile boundaries Darjeeling Himalaya has its own complicated history of political and physical progress and development. The present district of Darjeeling is a creation of the 19th century and is a result of almost accidental involvement of British India Government in the affairs of neighbourhood Himalayan States (Banerjee 1980*). Darjeeling attained its present dimensions in 1866 A.D.

This region was an integral part of the sovereign state of Sikkim till 1788-89 that was won over by Nepal and retained till 1816 when the plain areas of possession and Darjeeling part was handed to the British India while in the following year the whole of Darjeeling was restored to Sikkim by the British. Finally, on persuasion of the Governor general Lord Bentick, the Raja of Sikkim handed Darjeeling over to the British Indian Government on the 1st of February 1835. Kalimpong was ceded to the British Empire in 1865 by Sinchula Treaty (10th November 1865), from the Government of Bhutan, on lease and was notified then, as a subdivision of Dooars but finally transferred to Darjeeling district in 1866.

It is in this subdivision, Kalimpong College was established in the year 1962. Before the Chinese aggression of 1961-62 Kalimpong had its own importance of being the trade route to Tibet. But afterwards and in other ways this place has become the economic laggard the region mostly owing to its interior location. The importance of Kalimpong College (and hence other academic institutions of Kalimpong) has to be understood keeping these factors in view.

The subdivision of Kalimpong along with the plains of Dooars had no institution for imparting bachelor's degree till 1962. On the combined effort of the local students then studying outside, concerned citizens and the first secretary of this College, Kalimpong saw the inception of its first degree College in the same year. The government order has mentioned the aim of this institution as 'providing higher education to the people of the backward place of Kalimpong'. Therefore, it is obvious and understood that this College, at the time of its establishment was the only centre upon which the responsibilities of providing higher learning, accelerating civilization, strengthening civil society and guiding the marginalized post-colonial young citizens, rested. The College initiated its office and academic activities taking three rooms in Jr. BT College (present Govt. primary teachers training Institute) about 2 kilometers southwards from the town on 12th November 1962 with 25 students in the first year BA.. The founder Secretary, Mr Adhir Ranjan Bose, the then Principal of Peoples Janata College and Library, was the founder Secretary while Mr. Indramani Pradhan was the first In-charge of the College. In the following year (1963) the College was shifted to an independent cottage, the present Hill top tourist lodge.

The number of students was regularly increasing and as a consequence the College was shifted again to Nanduram building (also known as Wool godown) in the year 1971. The faculties of Commerce and Science were started in the same year (1971). The College authorities and the students were struggling for long in demand of their own land and building. In the process the peaceful Kalimpong town also witnessed the agitating students on the roads

with slogans. Finally, in the year 1981, after spending 18 years of its career in rented buildings the College was shifted to its own land and newly constructed building situated on the northern face of Rishi Bankim Chandra Park, about a kilometer up and southwards from Kalimpong town.

With the progress of time the College has been contributing towards the transformation of knowledge and education in the line of prevailing national standard incorporating the equality of opportunity, freedom, social justice and secularism. The College supports and provides free education for selected poor students. With Seek and ye shall find as its motto, the College boasts of having a students strength of 1775 at present. It enjoys the support from alumni association.

The institution is government aided (of the state of West Bengal) and affiliated to the university of North Bengal. The terms of appointment of staff and their salaries are as per and subject to the rules framed by the state government. The important academic matters such as framing of syllabus and conducting of examinations are controlled by the affiliating university. The apex administrative body of the college is the 'Governing body' constituted according to the norms laid down by the state government and the University statutes, in which out of a total twelve, four members (two each) are the nominees of the state government and the affiliating university. The College has the statutory body of students' union council and the General Secretary of this council is also the member of the Governing body.

There are 51 teaching members in the undergraduate faculty supported by 21 honteaching staff. A limited number of teachers are engaged in active research works in consultation with the various universities of India. Of the guided research students one, as of now, has been awarded the degree of Ph.D. Communications are being made for collaborative studies with other countries.

The library of the College was initially designed to provide the students with the books within their academic curricula. But the collections from the local culture and dialects were added afterwards. The journals, periodicals and literatures for reading and researches have been given due place in the collection. Presently there are 14,200 books in the College library.

The important features in the curricular activities are the conducting of the periodical internal tests and examinations, students' seminar on advanced learning and students' feed back evaluating the teaching and campus experiences. In addition to the curricular activities the students are exposed to opportunities of leadership building and character development through:

Games and sports- indoor and outdoor Social and Cultural aspects – dance, drama, music Debate and elocutions Creative writings through Wall and annual magazine

The elected students representatives of the Kalimpong College Students' Union Council conduct these activities under the supervision of a teacher. The College also offers the activities having national importance such as:

NCC (National Cadet Corps) NSS (National Service Scheme) Eco Club

Kalimpong College has a special cell conducting a special project since 1996 which provides opportunity of research on social and environmental issues and group working for undergraduate students. The project sponsored by ERC, New Delhi carries its importance because the undergraduate degree Colleges in India do not offer research programmes for their students. The projects like 'Campus Diversity Initiative' and 'Collaborative Diversity

Research' have been completed while, FAEA project for support of backward students have been sanctioned and 'Small grant Environmental projects" are on the process.

The result and findings disseminate a huge knowledge and experience to the students and faculty members.

In its 43 years of establishment the College has already produced some personalities of national and international fame. But the institution, in the first place takes care to cater the needs of the local youths whose guardians belong to the socio-economically backward community and who, normally have no other option to continue the higher education of their wards except in Kalimpong College.

It is a well-understood fact that the affiliated Colleges in India have very little autonomy in respect of curriculum structure. The Colleges providing undergraduate programmes need to act immediately towards offering innovative and applied courses suited to the present day social needs. This obviously will be implemented in a better manner through greater autonomy.

The criteria and method of evaluation by NAAC has become a great refresher to the thinking of development of the College and improvement in the academic standard. The wake call by the NAAC to an otherwise meritorious system will certainly drive towards identifying the strength and weaknesses of the college. The result should show the ways and means of moving towards brighter prospects in terms of opportunities and challenges coming along with the plan and expansion.

The first meeting of the Teachers' Council for discussion on the assessment by NAAC was held on 04.07.2003. The preparation of the self-study report consumed a longer time and exercise than originally set for. Initiated by the Principal, administrative staff and the teachers' council of the College the process involved the following steps:

- Compiling and writing by the steering committee. 10. Forwarding to the head office NAAC

The responsibility of preparation of the departmental inputs was taken by the departmental heads while the official records were compiled by the senior administrative staff.

In this way, the report in its present shape is the outcome of joint effort by the members of teachers' council, non-teaching staff and student representatives. The advisory participation of the rest of the stakeholders namely, guardians, members of the Governing Body and the members of the Alumni association were helpful and encouraging.

Kalimpong College has taken the assessment by NAAC very positively as a mechanism to standardise the quality of higher education all over the nation. The progress and development of the institution depends on how the institution supports and acts on the guidelines laid by the NAAC. With the completion of this compilation work, which also ensures a self-assessment and introspection, it is expected that the institution will take the help of this exercise to design its course of movement towards wider horizons.



The appointment of the Principal of the College is also done by the Governing body on recommendation of such a name by the College Service Commission from the panel prepared through time to time advertisement. The panel prepared is particular and meant for only one College that is mentioned in the advertisement.

If the sanctioned posts are lying vacant for long time and have been hampering the classes in the houours courses (such as in History, Geography, Economics and Commerce). temporary teachers are appointed. The department of Mathematics is being run with temporary teachers for the last two years. This College was also conducting classes XI and XII in Commerce from the inception of the +2 system till 2004 as an extension service because there was no school offering this course in the beginning. A few schools started the course later but that was insufficient to cater the need of the large number of local youths and also due to the fact that many of such schools were private organisations demanding high tuition fees.

The teachers and students are encouraged to work on it as a cocurricular activity, open air activity outside classroom and mostly as a work of students' own innovative thinking aimed at helping the needy people of the society. The first proposed activity on 'adult education is yet to take its shape.

- 2. How does the college plan to meet the need for augmenting the infrastructure to keep pace with academic growth?
 - A) The college approaches the Government of West Bengal for grant in aid for construction and maintenance of buildings, for the creation of posts of teachers in the subjects newly introduced, and also for the creation of posts of office staff. In case of the Government creating such posts the salaries are provided by the Government.
 - B) It gets developmental grant from the UGC as the college comes under the category of 12 f and 12 b.
 - C) The members of Parliament and Legislative Assembly provide grants from their fund time to time on our request for specific projects.
 - D) The Darjeeling Gorkha Hill Council, at times provide fund to us on request for meeting specific needs.
 - E) The college plans to raise donations to meet some of the developmental needs from identified donors and its Alumni Association will help in this matter.
 - F) A very modest developmental fee is collected from the students in the beginning of the Session.
 - G) The self financing courses have been started which will be expanded gradually so that the college is able to earn some amount of revenue in future.
 - H) The part time teachers are paid from the college fund
- 3. How does the college maintain its infrastructure?
 - A) The college maintains its infrastructure from its fund collected from the students' Tution, Development, Library and Special Contribution Fees which are very modest especially considering the service the students get from the College.
 - B) The Government of West Bengal and The Darjeeling Gorkha Hill Council provide fund for repair and white washing/painting of the College Buildings. But the aid from these sources is purely of adhoc nature; therefore, the College has to rely mostly on its own source of fund.

Kalimpong subdivision, where this College is located, is surrounded by rural areas with the population belonging to lower and "middle" middle class, and non-industrial sector. Therefore, in it's more than 40 years of existance it has not been able to find financial sponsors for developing as well as maintaining infrastructure.

- 4. How does the college ensure optimum utilisation of its infrastructure facilities?
 - A) There are various committees consisting of the Principal, Teachers and Non-Teaching Staff and Students' Representatives (depending on the nature of the tasks) which initiate as well as discuss submitted proposals and are involved in the process of implementation. In the initial stage proposals, plans, guidelines, college calendar or other matters are discussed at the committee level which are then taken up in the Teachers' Council's meeting or in combined meeting of the Teaching and Non Teaching Staff according to the need of issues. Issues involving finance and even other issues requiring the sanction of the Governing Body are placed in its meeting. This is a continuous process all through the year to ensure the optimum utilization of existing infrastructure.
 - B) The College runs in two shifts: Commerce in the Morning and Humanities, Bioscience and Pure science in the Day shifts as the space in the existing building is not adequate to meet the demands. Even in the Day shift, there are two sections A and B in the humanities departments to accommodate the increasing numbers of students. Each section consists of 150 students. The teaching hours of the College begin at 6-30 am in the morning and go upto 5 pm in the evening. The maximum rush hour, however, is between 10-30 am to 2-15 pm.



- 1. An institute of higher learning was long felt need of Kalimpong sub division. After either Matriculation/Higher Secondary education young people had to go to Darjeeling or elsewhere to pursue their higher education and it was not within the reach of one and all. Hence, to fulfill this need, Kalimpong College was established in 1962 offering Political Science along with other subjects. This was necessary because in all the high schools in the sub division of Kalimpong economics and civics was taught as a compulsory subject. Later on, Political Science was introduced in most of the schools at the Higher Secondary level. It became more imperative to give the students more Besides these, a student with good marks and desire for serious studies on the subject had to go elsewhere for Honours course. Hence, to meet this need also, the Honours course in the subject was introduced in 1967.
- The department has a good number of Alumni to its credit who have excelled in the subject, and have been serving in various Universities and Colleges in India and abroad. To name, but a few, Dr. R.P. Dhakal was a Reader in Political Science at

- Kurseong College for a number of years. He is now the present Principal of his alma mater, Kalimpong College. It is a matter of pride and honour for the department. The department also places on record with pride and joy to have two of it's alumni, viz. Smt. T.D. Gurung and Sri C.K. Subba in the College as Selection Grade Lecturers. Prof. T.B. Subba, Dean of Faculty, Arts and Commerce, NEHU; Dr. R.R. Dhamala, Reader, Dibrugarh University; Dr. A. Siddiqui; Smt. Namrata Pariyar, Senior Lecturer, Darjeeling Govt. 

CRITERION-WISE REPORT

CRITERION I (Curricular aspects):

Kalimpong College is a government sponsored (aided) institution and has a clearly stated goal and objective set by the government itself. This College was established to provide collegiate education to the backward area of Kalimpong. As it moved forward it has shown its possible progress and development. The opening of Commerce and Science sections, pure science and addition of subjects like Geography, Tourism management and Vocational English later after the establishment of the College reflects the attitude towards reviewing the present curricula and setting new goals. The College is willing to face new challenges of the changing time and take new missions.

This College is affiliated to the University of North Bengal and has no freedom to frame its own curriculum. The syllabus committee of the university in consultation with the teachers from Colleges designs and finalises the curricula for all subjects of the degree course. Therefore, this College offers limited options for the students in respect of Elective subjects, Languages and new courses. The introduction of new subjects needs prior permission from the West Bengal Higher Education Council and the affiliating University. Since the curricula are bound by the rules of the University and teaching learning method is fixed in a definite framework. The institution observes all instructions and directions of the Govt of West Bengal and University of North Bengal.

Left to its own design, the present curriculum reflects little scope for interdisciplinary interaction among the students. The additional activities of the College such as NCC, NSS, Eco club etc open opportunities for the students for interdisciplinary understanding. This College has a unique (there are only 18 College in India in the venture) practice of projects like Campus diversity Initiative programmes and Collaborative Diversity Research programme organized by the College and sponsored by the ERC, New Delhi from time to time has given great experience and learning to the students participating in it. The programme provides learning outside classroom, research experience and traveling to other parts and Colleges of India eg. Karnataka, Maharastra, Uttaranchal, Delhi, Orissa, Jharkhand etc. No College in India provides research opportunity for undergraduate students. This programme was specially designed to meet out this part of the College education and the experience of the students are very encouraging through which the students get general awareness and understand the environmental and social issues, segregate evils and design reconciliation.

The approval of the courses from the WBHEC of the Govt. of West Bengal, is a time and effort taking work especially for the Colleges of hill areas like Kalimpong, located far

away from Calcutta. The development of a College completely depends upon the leadership and effort of the Principal and Governing Body of the College. In case of the aided Colleges, when considered from one viewpoint, the Principal is an administrative employee and the members of the Governing Body are socially engaged and busy persons. In such cases if these persons are unable to spare enough time for the public institution the progress will go slow, and the ultimate sufferers will be the students and hence the place. This may be considered as one of the reasons for backwardness.

However, the self financed courses like the Diploma courses in Tourism Management and Vocational Languages get quick permission from the University now a days. But the College can afford to open self financed courses only for the diploma, at present and looks forward to do more in this line in future.

CRITERION II (Teaching, Learning and Evaluation):

ADMISSION PROCESS

The admission process is transparent in Kalimpong College. The responsibility of The admission process is transparent in the Admission committee with Principal as its President and admission is entrusted to the Admission committee with Principal as its President and admission is entrusted to the Aumission comment. The other members (3 teaching members Secretary, Teacher's Council as ex officio member. The other members of the meeting of the members Secretary, Teacher's Council as ex officio members) are elected in the meeting of the Teachers' from 3 faculties and 2 non teaching members) are elected in the meeting of the Teachers' from 3 faculties and 2 non teaching memory, and council and non-teaching staff separately. The College has gone through a number of changes in the criteria of admission over the time period and with the increase in the number of in the criteria of admission over the time period of students and subjects/course taught. Basically, there are two separate admission categories - i) students and subjects/course taught. Dasteany, the students and subjects/course taught. Dasteany, the honours and ii) general course. The process of admission tests to the honours courses was practiced till 2002 while the admission to the general courses were entertained on merit of the board examination of class XII. In case of the general course the College keeps provision to admit 100% applicants, especially if they are the locals from Kalimpong. Now, all admissions are taken on merit of the board examination of class XII. Reservations to the SC, ST OBC students are made as per the existing University and the govt. rules. The local students of the Hill areas are given priority while the overseas students are welcome. The criteria framed are as per the need of the hour that satisfies the interest of the student mass. The present criteria 1.

- 75% of the seats are reserved for the students of Kalimpong subdivision. 2.
- 25% of the seats are left open for the students from other areas of India and 3.
- 75% of the seats again reserved for the students coming from West Bengal Board of Secondary Education (WBBSE) and West Bengal Council of Secondary Education (WBCSE). 4
- 25% of the seats are reserved for students from other boards such as ICSE and CBSE

Such criteria are kept flexible in case of admission to general courses only and if the permitted number of seats is lying vacant. The forms and prospectus can be requisitioned from the office of the College during the admission time, usually after the publication of the results of the Higher Secondary (10+2) examination. However, the foreign nationals can ask

TEACHING-LEARNING EFFORTS:

Kalimpong College has two shifts of teaching schedules- one in the morning for the Commerce department starting at 6-30 am and the other in the day, for Science and Humanities starting at 9 am. In the beginning the Commerce unit (morning section) was held

in the evening. But due to certain hill area constraints the timings were changed to the present system. As a result, the Commerce department is also facilitated with more space and classrooms in the morning. The College pays special attention to see that the number of working days and effective teaching days are maintained and practiced to confirm to the required standard. The number of the teaching days is higher than the minimum of 180 days stipulated by the UGC and the University of North Bengal. The College offers facilities for special classes whenever needed and demanded by a teacher even during the University examinations and winter vacations.

The college has a supportive and dedicated team of teaching and non-teaching staff. The Governing Body takes free and quick decision to appoint part time and temporary teachers in the vacancies created by retirement, transfer or resignation in the greater interest of the students. The incurring expenses of salary of such appointments are met from the college fund. This appointment is necessary and justified, because the College Service Commission may sometimes take more time than usual to send the required teacher 20 % of the teachers and 40% of the office staff are part timers.

The experimental project conducted by the College under the sponsorship of ERC, New Delhi has been of great benefit to the students especially because this was related to research exposure to the UG students and this involved travel and studies in the field. Models, charts, limited number of field studies and sample materials along with usual practical classes, aid the teaching in science. Other departments in Social science and Literature conduct the educational tours and workshops. The visit to places and creative writings have always encouraged the students towards understanding nature and environment. There are very limited scope and sources to use the latest technological teaching aids. However, a few lectures in a year are held using the computer and LCD projector. The OHPs are also used by the students during their seminar presentations. The student seminar held every month in the College has also helped the general students to develop their confidence and knowledge in the subject and look towards higher learning. The College supports a medium sized library with 14,200 books for the students. The library also offers book bank service.

The faculty members are encouraged to prepare and follow teaching plan under the guidance of the head of the department. The plan helps the teachers to complete syllabus in time and manage tutorial classes in the end, as necessary. The faculty members are encouraged to attend national and international seminars and conferences as resource persons, consultants and participants. The value of such participation in updating the knowledge through discussion, interaction and attending is discussed in the special meetings of the departments/College. 34 teachers have participated (7 as resource persons) in the national and 07 have attended (1 as resource person) in the international seminars in the last two years. The College has also hosted 4 seminars in the College; two of them being the UGC sponsored seminars in the last two years.

EVALUATION OF THE PERFORMANCES OF THE TEACHERS:

Kalimpong College has two kinds of evaluations conducted on teachers. The evaluation is guided by the 'education committee' constituted taking senior teachers and office superintendent (OS) in it, with the Principal as the chairman. In the first category, the teachers take the process of self-appraisal. In the form prescribed for the purpose, the teachers evaluate themselves by answering 37 questions divided in three parts viz A) qualification and career development of self, B) Teaching and relation with the students and C) Relation with the administrative staff and difficulties faced.

In the second category the performance of the respective teachers are evaluated by the outgoing students in the prescribed forms after they receive their passed mark sheet of the degree examination. The students answer 26 questions in the form designed to focus the features on the personality, punctuality, subject knowledge, method of teaching, command on language and expression, attitude towards co-curricular activities, relationship with the students etc of the teacher.

The introduction of the method of evaluation that was started in the College three years ago has proved to be of great significance for the teachers of the College. The teachers are challenged to identify their shortcomings from the feed back evaluation of the students and apply remedial measures in their teaching career in future. The comparative assessment of the two kinds of evaluation helps them to understand the correctness of the self-appraisal. The College is also considering the idea to carry evaluation of the members of non-teaching staff and offer them time for exposure and training.

With the benefit it has imparted, the two methods of evaluation will remain to be a permanent feature in the annual activity of the College.

MONITORING THE STUDENT PERFORMANCES:

According to the recent directive of the NBU (2005) the degree examinations will be conducted in three parts with effect from 2006, replacing the existing system of two parts. As a result the preparatory schedule for examination for the students and respective duties for the College has changed and tightened. 75% of attendance in the class has been made compulsory as one of the criteria for appearing in the University examination. The departments concerned conduct regular class tests to monitor the application of the students. On the completion of three months tenure after admission to the College the performance tests are conducted for honours students to approve their merit. In addition, the sent-up tests are the usual feature of preparation for the final examination.

Kalimpong College has exhibited satisfactory performances in the University examination since its establishment in 1962. The pass percentage of the year 2004 is 87.5 %. Several students have occupied the University toppers' place to win Gold and Silver medals. (detailed list in the Appendix 10).

CRITERION III (Research, Consultancy and Extension):

As in any other UG College of the state, the activities on research and consultancy has been limited by several factors in Kalimpong College. In the first place, the service condition in the College encourages but does not make the research mandatory. The pressure of every day duties including class teaching, examinations, evaluation of answer scripts of home and University examinations, student union activities and sub ordinate committee activities keeps the faculty engaged throughout the year. In addition, the junior members have to arrange and seek outing for the Orientation and Refresher courses. The lack of proper research level infrastructure facilities, apparatus and chemicals for laboratory based subjects is another factor to reduce the activities and motivation of research. But along with such time frame and limited scope, the College gives considerable importance and privilege for research works. The teachers can take FIP leave to visit various Universities in India as per UGC rules for carrying out research for Ph.D degree. Support is also extended to researchers at home. Though not very frequently the faculty members attend various national and international seminars and conferences on their personal effort. Within the last two years 2 teachers have been conferred with the degree of Ph D. 28 papers and 8 books have been published by the faculty members of the College.

Under such circumstances Kalimpong College is proud to have a laboratory recognized by the University of North Bengal for carrying out research leading to the Ph D degree in the department of Botany. It may be mentioned that this College is one of very few Colleges in the region, which has a recognized research laboratory. One scholar has been awarded the degree of Ph D in 2003 while the other is due to submit his thesis very soon. Some of the teachers participate in the consultancy workshops but this has not been made a source of revenue for the College yet. Within these constraints and parameters the College feels that the research and extension services is not given its importance and attention. But, it duly understands the place of research and development in modern day of civilization and intends to do better in time to come.

The College has supported a few extension programmes in collaboration with the NGOs. Dr. Jaishree Pradhan, in-charge of the Eco club joins hand with the ATREE, Citrus Dieback Research Station, DGHC and other NGOs to organize various training programmes to students of the different Schools and Colleges, public and farmers of the region. Dr S K Mukherjee extends his service in awareness programmes and medical camps to local villagers, tea garden labours and flood victims. Consumer awareness programmes was conducted in the College through Essay writing, Quiz and Debates.

The College in a joint venture with the ERC, New Delhi has been taking up collaborative studies with the students of USA, which may include exchange visits of the students involved. This venture will also give exposure to the students to researches in the UG level. This College is also processing an understanding with the Pitzer College of USA for collaborative activities and classes.

CRITERION IV (Infrastructure and Learning Resources);

The developmental works and maintenance of the infrastructure in the institution are taken up as per the Master Plan. Kalimpong College has 1.71 acres area of land in the present location towards the north of the Rishi Bankim Chandra Park about 1 km southwards from the town. There is scope for expanding and adding more land area in future. The College has the town. There is scope for expanding and adding more land area in future are categories there are 38+1 rooms in total, in two buildings. When they are classified to three categories there are 3+2 large classrooms accommodating more than 100 students in them, 9 medium sized rooms accommodating 60+ students in them and 2 small rooms for honours classes. In the science departments there are 10 laboratories for practical classes including 1 research lab.

The administrative set up is accommodated within the main building but in the justified location. It consists of 1 examination cum storeroom, 1 Principal's room, 1 Head assistant cum general office room, 1 cash counter room. In addition, the College has 1 general hall, 2 staff rooms, 1 Boys' common room, 1 Girls' common room, 1 NCC room, 1 students' union room, 1 library with reading room and 1 canteen. There are 6 lavatories (4 men's and 2 women's) in the main building. A new separate students' toilet block is being constructed, as per the master plan which will be completed by January 2006.

The maintenance of the building and laboratories requires a huge annual budget. Kalimpong College does not receive any grant meant for the purpose of maintenance from the government or other sources. The growing need of expenses on maintenance of the infrastructure including the equipments has put regular pressure on the budget allocated for other essential areas. The College authority on requisition receives help from the fund of the MP and MLA at times to meet the need. The management of the College is seriously concerned about the creation of regular fund for the purpose.

This College has not been able to construct hostels for the students and residential quarters for the staff. The students of this College usually come from the nearby areas of Sikkim, Darjeeling, Kurseong, Dooars, Northeastern states, Bhutan, Nepal and surrounding rural areas of Kalimpong. 47.4 % of the students are females and they have to face various financial strains and other difficulties while staying in private hostels. This is one of the shortcomings of the College, which needs to be addressed to at an earliest convenience. The computerization and inter-connection of the library is yet another important task, which the College wants to take up as early as possible. The College also understands the need of students and starting of new courses. The institution runs a xerox centre but the interact and telephone services are yet to be installed.

One must admit, that this College is suffering from financial constraints. The management is dependent on the Government while—very a nascent approach has been self-financed courses. The College is in a need to generate a suitable amount of fund developmental works. Definitely, there is a lot more to do, in this regard.

CRITERION V (Student Support and Progression):

Kalimpong College nurtures the necessary guidance and co-operation to facilitate students' progression and development. As provided by the Government rules and University statutes, the General Secretary of the students' union is one of the members of the Governing Body, the apex administrative body of the College. The General Secretary is again an annually elected member from the 28 students who in turn are directly elected by the general students. In this manner the students have participation in the management of the College. This is an example of provision for development of leadership quality among the students who will have to guide their fellow friends and citizens in the society and the nation tomorrow. There are five committees of the student representatives designed to monitor the various activities as follows:

- 1. Social and Cultural affairs
- 2. Games and sports (outdoor)
- 3. Library and Magazine
- 4. Debate and Seminar
- 5. Common room (Boys' and Girls') and indoor Games

Each committee has a member from the teachers' council as the In-charge of the committee to supervise and guide the organizing of activities. The group activities play a significant role in developing the personality and character of the students.

Kalimpong College receives a respectable number of applicants from Sikkim, Bhutan, Nepal and North-eastern states in search of quality education. There are 1540 students studying in the College at present of which 811 (52.6 %) are boys and 729 (47.4 %) are girls. The number of students from other states and overseas is 306 (20 % of the total) of which 129 (8.5 %) are boys and 177 (11.5 %) are girls.

Kalimpong College is proud to have one of the best NCC units of 5 Bengal BN NCC. With the motto of 'unity and discipline' the NCC delivers the development of personality, inculcation of discipline, self confidence, leadership,, sense of responsibility, and awareness of national integration among its cadets. This is also considered as the nursery for propagating secularism, value of patriotism, selfless service and sense of hard work.

Since 1963 this College has been extending NCC service to the male students and also to the female students since 2004. The cadets are trained in the College and various regional

and national training camps at regular intervals. Since 2001, 62 candidates have passed 'B' certificate and 15 have passed the prestigious 'C' certificate examination of which the latter enables them to sit for the various National Defence Services Commission Examinations directly. The NCC office record shows an encouraging picture of placements in jobs. Most of the NCC students have joined military and para-military services like GR, CRPF, CISF, Assam Rifles, EFR, BSF, etc while others have taken up profession in West Bengal Police Service, LIC, Banks, teaching etc. Some of them have also become advocates and call centre executives. Republic day camp at Delhi is the most prestigious national camp aspired by all NCC cadets. It should be mentioned with pride that the students from Kalimpong College keep their flag flying high by representing this camp every year. In the process our students

are regularly selected to participate in the republic day parade of the nation on 26th January at Delhi. 18 cadets from this College have participated in the RD parade since 1989.

NSS is another student activity in the College. With the watchword of 'Not me but you' the NSS expresses the essence of democratic living, upholds the need for selfless service and appreciation of other man's point of view and to show consideration. The Kalimpong College unit of NSS was established long back in the 80s and has been revived in the recent past. It has been working to understand the community in which they live. The NSS activities include fieldwork and social service, campus cleaning and plantation, awareness campaign through debate, essay writing, quiz, participation in the programmes of other NSS unit etc. The College also observes the grand NSS day annually.

The Eco Club is one of the important features in the College. It helps the students to understand their social responsibility to protect and conserve nature and its resources. It is also aimed at developing their attitude towards working in a group for general social cause and participatory activities. Some of the activities undertaken by the College under the guidance of the club are annual observation of the environment day of the College where the students hold workshops, campus cleaning, tree plantation, attending seminars and training organized by other institutions and NGOs, awareness campaign etc. Special attention is given to the programmes related to regional environmental issues such as Municipal Solid Waste Management, pollution and control, deforestation, bio piracy, crop diversity, land degradation, bio farming, water management etc. where the learners get the opportunity to listen to resource persons of national and international distinction. The activities inside the College campus are graciously participated by the teaching and non-teaching staff, students and student union members.

Started recently but enthusiastically this College has an *alumni* association, which is fast increasing in popularity. The *alumni* is meeting regularly and discussing the plans to deliver their expertise, direction and help in promoting the academic interest of the College and Kalimpong as a whole. Within the long 44 years of its existence thousands of students have passed out from this College who are placed in various positions in different walks of life. This College boasts of having many of its alumni in the prestigious ranks and posts like Secretaries in Sikkim, Bhutan and DGHC, WBCS officers, Police Officers and commissioned officers in the defence services. Some members have excelled as industrialists, as executives in multinational companies, as journalists, editors and writers and as filmmakers and directors. Some of our alumni have entered the field of socio-political public service and are now holding the posts of ministers in Sikkim and member of the Legislative Assembly. West Bengal, while hundreds of them have represented the public in local self Government bodies.

The College has the mechanism to use student feedback for quality enhancement. The students are facilitated to write on and evaluate the College and it's teaching community (explained in Criterion VII).

The prospectus of the College is published annually. It carries information on the College and its management, eligibility of admission, fees structure, programmes offered including career-oriented courses, attendance, examinations, seminars, student union activities, NCC, NSS, student scholarships and faculty strength.

The College has a career counseling and guidance cell and two of the trained faculty members for the purpose but has not been able to run to the required standard. The College placed the opening of a 'placement service' in its long term plan.

As mentioned earlier in the preface, this College receives a large number of students from the backward rural places and communities. An estimated 80% students belong to this category. In such circumstances, the College is also committed to nurture certain part of the poor section of the society. The College offers free-ship to the poor students. The "Annapurna Bhattacharya" scholarship is awarded to the poor meritorious students after their evaluation in their internal examination. The stipends received by the students belonging SC/ST category and by the wards of army personnels from the respective departments are the usual feature and needs little mention.

Kalimpong College has been selected by the Foundation for Academic Excellence and Access (FAEA) an international NGO with its office at New Delhi for various scholarship programmes for the backward students. The College is sponsored for programmes like Computer training, language training, coaching center and small scale research activity for about 50 students every year. In addition, three meritorious students from the College receive scholarship of about Rs. 2500/- per month and contingency for studies up to PG level.

CRITERION VI (Organisation and Management):

Kalimpong College has a collective management. The policies of management are governed by the principles of participation. The apex body of administration and management is the Governing body. Being a Government aided (sponsored) institution the College follows certain basic rules of the Government of West Bengal and statutes of the University of North Bengal. The following members constitute the governing Body:

All major decisions, new ventures and activities need the approval of the Governing Body. The power of sanctioning of posts lies with Govt. of West Bengal and recommendation of names for appointment (in the grant-in-aid scheme) with West Bengal College Service Commission.

The institution aspires a balanced planning of academic and administrative activities. The Teachers' Council (TC) is a statutory committee that assists the administration in all to take on the different responsibilities as under:

- Election committee
- Library committee

The Heads of all the departments are entrusted with their respective departmental responsibilities while there is a separate In-charge in the morning (Commerce) department.

The office (non-teaching) staff structure is constituted by the Principal, Head assistant cum Office superintendent, Cashier, Accountant, LDC, typist and other group D staff. There are two assistants to the librarian in the library.

The Kalimpong College Students Union (KCSU) is the students' body to share the responsibility of proper and smooth management with the College authority. The *alumni* association has already started sharing works with the College administration in organizing programmes related to civil defence and career guidance/counseling.

A Building Committee has been constituted recently with the members of UGC/University, Public Works Department, Governing Body of the College and teaching and non-teaching staff in it as per the UGC norms to monitor the building works in the College.

The non-teaching staff of the College has a self-generated welfare fund, which is used by the members in the time of emergency and acute needs. The College has an Employees' Co-operative Credit Society for all employees of the College. The society facilitates the members to avail money loan for different purposes (especially housing). The College has the grievance and redressal cell for the students and staff.

The system of preparation of the annual budget has been started recently. The accounts of the College is audited annually by the auditors nominated by the government of West Bengal. The financial management is done by the Principal's office. The responsibility of accounts and keeping of the records in proper order lies with the Principal assisted by the Head Assistant, Cashier and the Accountant. The finance committee of the College that has limited itself to preparation of the annual budget only will assist in other areas including purchasing, in future. The system of internal audit is proposed to be applied from the session most important aspects. The College fund is far from satisfactory while the day-to-day amount of savings from the fund collected, as fees have been lying with the College to earn Governing Body of College has been discussing matters in the line of generating its own finance in order to meet ever-increasing demands.

The image of management and organization is often reflected in the discipline of the institution. Except for a few small instances during very adverse situations of the Gorkahland agitation in the 80s and early 90s when the whole hills were on fire, this College has never any breach in its discipline. In this respect, the management and students of this College deserve kudos.

CRITERION VII (Healthy practices):

Kalimpong College can hold its head high in adopting a few but noteworthy healthy practices.

The College has its goal and objective. The administration has been decentralized. The teachers' Council, through its sub-committees, shares the load of management in the areas mentioned in the criterion VI above (list). The students' union council participates in organizing most of the programmes of the College in addition to their independent students' welfare activities.

The College has the master plan for land and infrastructure (enclosed-Annexure 7) and vision for future for academic excellence.

The practice of the self-appraisal and student feed back method has been acceptable to all concerned and in fact; this has become very helpful in identifying and rectifying weaknesses of the teachers concerned wherever applicable. The College also started to collect views of the senior alumni members on the administrative and academic matters and their experience in campus life.

Kalimpong College is a centre for wide diversity of students from different races and faiths from places far and near. This institution encourages secularism and national integration in its campus life and does not permit activities related to myth and imaginations. However, it welcomes and holds value-based talks on literature, culture and philosophy, at times and occasions.

With the intention to inculcate the importance of group activities, the College carries out exchange programmes from time to time with the Colleges of the different parts of India such as Goa, Karnataka, Maharastra. Rajasthan, Uttaranchal, Orissa, Meghalaya and Calcutta.

It is also initiating exchange study programmes with the Pitzer College of USA. A few Pitzer students have already been accommodated to attend some classes in this College. In addition, the College has already agreed to carry a cross-cultural student exchange programme with the students of some Colleges from US, in collaboration with the ERC, New Delhi.

Through the activities of Eco-club, NCC and NSS the College educates its students for clean and pollution free environment. The students participate in the civil education activities such as traffic control, AIDS awareness programmes, blood donation camps. These students are also trained for giving emergency services in case of fire, accidents and natural calamities such as landslides.

The administrative staff is sensitized to latest managerial concepts, but no training and refresher programmes have been provided or organised so far. The office of the College has

been computerized for records and accounts only. The system of internal quality checks is very primitive as well.

The Governing Body of the College in consultation with the TC, NTS and KCSU has been working out definite related issues towards promoting the academic and general interest of the College in the process of gearing up to meet its objectives and challenges of the changing time. The *alumni* members of the College have requested to build up bridges for participation of the community in the College activities.

The College has not been able to introduce the degree courses on Information Technology and Computer but has plans for the same and hopes that its students are not deprived for long. The language lab and computer centre sponsored and already sanctioned by the FAEA will deliver great service to the students in terms of developing communication skills, availing basic computer education and Internet access.

SUMMARY

Kalimpong College, situated at remote but a place beautifully created by nature, is the sole College in the subdivision established for imparting higher education for all sections of sole College in the subdivision established near. It has already spent aperiod of 44 valuable years and martired many thousand souls towards becoming respected citizens of the nation.

The historical incidences over the world have shown that good intentions do not always bring good results. But the efforts have to continue and the show must go on. Every organization has certain goals to realize for which the concept of "organization development itself is a necessary condition. Due to the historical and socioeconomic reasons, Kalimpong College has not been able to achieve "organization development" to the extent that is required for achieving its goals. However, sincere attempts are being made to identify its strength and weaknesses in the context of the opportunity provided by NAAC so that the institution is oriented towards 'organization development' to increase its capacity to achieve the goals of providing higher education and social development.

STRENGTH OF THE COLLEGE:

One of the strongest characters of this institution is the prevalent unity amongst its various human resource components: the teachers, the non-teaching staff, Students Union Council and the students in general. There is a deep sense of belonging towards the institution, which has enabled them to function effectively within the limited

Kalimpong College conducts the teaching and learning programmes throughout the year as per its annual calendar without interference and disturbance.

 Politicisation has adversely affected many higher educational institutions in India. Fortunately, Kalimpong College has been successful in keeping itself safe from any such adversity. Therefore, factionalism and politicking have not infiltrated in the system. The academic and working environment is healthy.

The achieved sense of belonging and unity has facilitated the institution to organize extra-curricular activities effectively throughout. The activities referred in the part I and II of SSR such as ERC student exchange activities, FAEA, College and student Seminars. Eco Club, NCC, NSS and Games and Sports are some of the students support activities of inspiration.

It may be mentioned that the absence of any football and playground has failed to hinder the skill of the College footballers that have continuously remained University champions for the last four years. Our students have won the University. Sikkim state open and Darjeeling open marathon races in the recent years.

- 5. The College boasts of having a recognized research lab in the department of
- Botany carrying out researches leading to the degree of Ph D.
- 6. Kalimpong College has been able to address the needs of higher education of the socio economically deprived section of the society to a large extent in tune with the national goals of development with equity and justice. The College has 47.4% of female students who are performing satisfactorily in the University examinations and co-curricular activities. 104 (6.8 %) of the students belong to SC and 411 (26.7 %) to ST category while 168 (10.9) % students are from the OBC category.
- A sizeable number of students from Bhutan, Nepal, Sikkim and Northeastern states take admission in this College every year. This institution has earned popularity and appreciation from these areas for the academic and general environment.
- 8. Most of the students of this College hail from the marginalized section of the society with poor family educational background, many of whom are the first generation literates. Yet, with the effort and dedication of the teachers the pass percentage is more than satisfactory.
- The College has recently formed Alumni association, which aims to help and direct the management to promote the academic interest of the College.
- Kalimpong College campus maintains and strives for a peaceful and pollution free environment.

WEAKNESSES:

- The College is running amidst the shortage of buildings and classrooms.
 - a/ There is no separate library building.
 - b/ The long desired construction of students Hostels and quarters for the staff and a guesthouse has not materialized.
 - c/ There is no separate administrative block in the College
 - d/ The student and staff Canteen of the College is below the required standard.
 - e/ Conference room and auditorium is lacking
- Shortage of teaching and non-teaching staff-

Teaching: Since there are more than 150 students in some of the humanities subjects they have been divided into sections. The number of teachers is not sufficient.

Non-teaching: Staff pattern is not yet approved by the Govt. of West Bengal despite repeated requests and reminders. Existing vacancies are also not filled up. Therefore, the College is compelled to appoint a limited number of part timers using its own fund.

- There is lack of infrastructure for self-financing courses.
- The College has been able to use computers only in the office and Commerce computer centre is yet to be realized.

- One of the major weaknesses of the College is shortage of resources and skill for generating its own finance and fund.

FUTURE PLANS

The planning of future activities in an institution like ours should keep in mind the needs of the youth and the contemporary society. Kalimpong College has plans for development and extension for the future as follows:

FOR IMMEDIATE ACTION:

- Computerisation of library
- Acquiring more land from the adjacent park area of the DGHC. Dialogues have been initiated
- Landscaping the Campus.
- Construction of Library building
- Construction of Administrative block
- Extension of classrooms
- Introducing Sociology as elective subject
- Introduction of professional courses on Financial management, Mass communication journalism and DIT.

LONG TERM PLAN:

- Introduction of Bachelors degree in BCA, Microbiology, Environmental Science, Drama and Music, Rural development/ Social Works.
- Introduction of Masters degree in: English , Political Science , Nepali, EVS, Rural development/Social works.
- Construction of Staff quarters and student hostels
- Construction of Sports centre and auditorium
- Installation of Water harvesting for the College.

This institution intends to keep its options open for any contingencies that may arise in course of time and future needs of the society.

A responsibility of an educational institution increases more and more as it moves forward. Many of the aspirations expressed here seem far-fetched now. It may take time but with the motto of seek and ye shall find Kalimpong College is set to move forward towards the realization of these cherished goals.

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ANNEXURE - I

Acts and Statutes of the College

Statutes relating to Governing Bodies of colleges

Constitution of Governing Body

(1) Save as otherwise provided in Statute 8 the Governing Body of a college shall consist of the following members:

(a) A President to be elected in the manner prescribed in paragraph (2).

(b) The Principal of the college who shall be the Secretary of the Governing

Body, Ex-officio:

(c) Four members to be elected from amongst themselves by the whole-time teachers of the college, whole-time librarians and whole-time physical instructors holding appointments against posts approved by the State Government/Competent Authority at a meeting to be convened for the purpose by the Principal of the college and presided over by him or, in his absence, by the senior most teacher available.

Note - The Principal shall not vote in this election:

(d) two members to be elected from amongst themselves by the whole time nonteaching employees of the college holding appointments against posts approved by the State Government/Competent Authority at a meeting to be presided over by the Principal of the college or, in his absence, by a teacher of the college authorized by the Principal.

Note: In the case of a tie in an election referred to in clause © or clause (d), the presiding officer shall draw lots and declare the result in the same meeting;

(e) two members to be nominated by the State Government, at least one of whom shall be an educationist;

(f) two members to be nominated by the Executive Council of whom at least one

shall be a woman, in case of a Women's College;

(g) one representative of the regular students of the college who shall be the duly elected General Secretary of the Students' Union and who shall continue to be a member so long as he continues to be the General secretary.

In the absence of the Union or a duly elected General Secretary of the Students' Union, the regular student of the college shall elect one representative from amongst themselves under the arrangements made by the Principal of the college or, in his absence, by a teacher of the college authorized by the Principal.

(h) not more than two members to be nominated by the Vice- Chancellor in consultation with the Vice-Chairman of the Council of Undergraduate Studies concerned from among the donors, if any, included in the list of donors of the college;

Provided that such members shall include persons required to be included in the Governing Body of the college under the terms and conditions of donation to the college;

Provided further that after the commencement of these Statutes no condition shall be attached to any donation to a college requiring representation of the donor in the Governing Body of the college;

Provided also that no teacher or other employee of the college who is a donor shall be nominated as such member.

(2). The President of a Governing Body of a college shall be elected by members in categories (b) to (h) of paragraph (1) at the first meeting of the Governing Body to be convened by the Principal and to the chaired by him.

The President may or may not be elected from among those members, provided that no teacher or non-teaching employee or student shall be eligible to be elected as the President.

Tenure of Office of the Governing Body

Statute 2

(a) The term of office of the Governing Body of any college constituted under Statute 1 shall be four years with effect from the date of election of the President of the Governing Body or from the date of expiry of the term of office of the previous Governing Body, whichever is later.

Provided that the first Governing Body constituted under paragraph © shall commence functioning from the date of election of the President and shall hold office for a period of four years from the date of such election:

Provided further that if the formation and/or functioning of the first Governing Body in accordance with the provisions of these Statutes is not possible for any reason whatsoever, the University shall appoint an Administrator who shall have all the powers and whatsoever, the University shall appoint an Administrator who shall have all the powers and functions of the Governing Body, till such Governing Body is actually formed and/or stang functioning.

- (b) At least three months before the expiry of the term of office of the members of the Governing Body of a college, the Secretary of the Governing Body shall take necessary steps to ensure that the election/nomination of members of the Governing Body under steps to ensure that the election/nomination of members of the expiry of the terms of office of Statute 1 is completed not later than one month before the expiry of the terms of office of such outgoing members.
- The Principal of every college affiliated to this University shall take necessary steps to constitute the first Governing Body of that college including election of the President under the Statutes within six months with effect from the date on which the Statutes come into force and the term of office of the Governing Body so constituted shall be four years from the date of nomination of the President.
- (d) After the expiry of the term of four years and subject to the provisions of paragraph (a), a Governing Body of a college shall cease to function and if, in the meantime, the new Governing Body has not been formed in accordance with these Statutes or is unable to take over the management of the college, the University shall either extend the life of the erstwhile Governing Body for a period not exceeding eighteen months or appoint an Administrator for a period not exceeding eighteen months who shall have all the powers and functions of the Governing Body until a new Governing Body is constituted or until as Governing Body takes over charge, as the case may be, in accordance with the Statute. The Administrator shall take steps for the constitution of the new Governing Body within six months of his appointment, where such Governing Body has not yet been constituted.

Filling up of casual vacancy

Statute 3

- (a) Any casual vacancy in the office of a member of the Governing Body of a college other than an ex-officio member shall be filled by an authority or an electorate which nominated or elected the member whose seat has become vacant and in the same manner as prescribed in statute 1.
- (b) A member nominated or elected to fill a casual vacancy shall hold office for the remainder of the terms of office of the member in whose seat the vacancy has occurred.

- © The office of an elected or nominated member of the Governing Body shall become vacant if -
 - (i) he absents himself from four consecutive meetings of the Governing Body without obtaining leave of absence from the Governing Body; or

(ii) he is found to be of unsound mind or convi9cted or any offence involving moral turpitude; or

(iii) he ceases to b a member of the constituency from which he has been elected or nominated.

Action of Governing Body not to be invalidated by reason of vacancies

Statute 4

(a) No action by the Governing Body shall be invalidated by reason of any vacancy in the office of any member thereof.

(b) For the removal of doubt, it is also hereby declared that notwithstanding any failure of the State Government, the Executive Council or the Vice-Chancellor to nominate any member or members under clause (e) or clause (f) or clause (h), as the case may be, of Statute 1, the constitution of a Governing Body under these Statutes shall be deemed to be complete.

Powers and functions of the Governing Body

Statutes 5

(a) The Governing Body of every college shall be responsible for the proper management of the affairs of the college and may exercise all such powers and functions as may be necessary for the purpose.

(b) In particular, and without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing provisions,

the Governing Body of a college shall be responsible for ensuring -

(j) that review is made of the results of the college and the University examinations and measures are adopted for academic improvement and maintenance of academic standards;

(ii) that posts are created and appointments made of the Principal and teachers and other staff in accordance with the provisions of any law of any rules or orders for the time being in force to provide the instruc tional and other services necessary for the efficient and effective operation of the college;

(iii) that the number and qualifications and the method of recruiting the teachers, librarians and non-teaching staff and the conditions of their service are in accordance with the provisions of any law or any rules or orders for the time being in force;

(iv) that the laboratory and other instructional facilities available are ade -

quate for the instructional programme;

(v) that the buildings in which the college is located are suitable for the purpose for which they are intended and are maintained at a satisfactory state of repair and sanitation;

(vi) that the library is properly equipped;

(vii) that the financial resources of the college are sufficient to ensure efficient and effective management of the college;

(viii) that all information, returns, reports and other materials required by the University, the U.G.C. and the State Government are promptly collected, prepared and made available to the University, the U.G.C. and the State Government;

(ix) that all books, registers, records and accounts required to be main tained are kept up-to-date;

 (x) that due provision is made for the well-being of students, manage – ment of their hostels, health, recreation and sports;

(xi) that the students' discipline is maintained;

(xii) that proper assistance and facilities are given to the Inspector of Colleges and other persons appointed by the University for inspection and report;

(xiii) that directions issued by the University from time to time are carried out and compliance with them reported speedily to the University; and

(xiv) that all properties and funds of the college are properly controlled and administered.

(xv) the Governing Body may appoint an Academic Sub-Committed and such other sub-committee as it may think fit, to advise the Gover – ning Body for the efficient administration of the college. Such subcommittee may include teachers of the college who are not members of the Governing Body. The Principal shall ordinarily be the Chairman of the sub-committees as may be formed.

Meetings of the Governing Body

Statutes 6

(a) Meetings of the Governing Body of a college shall be held at least four times in a year.

(b) For a meeting of the Governing Body of a college and quorum shall be the simple majority of the total number of the Governing Body.

The Secretary shall send copies of minutes of the previous meeting along with the notice of the meeting ordinarily seven days before the date of the meeting. The President may reduce the period of notice in case of emergency.

(a) The Secretary shall call a meeting if the President so directs him in writing or if at least fifty per cent of the members of the Governing Body requisition a

Functions of the Secretary of the Governing Body

Statute 7

The Secretary of the Governing Body of every college shall

(i) convene the meeting of the Governing Body, maintain the records, conduct the official correspondence and keep the minutes of proceedings of meetings of the

(ii) send to the Executive Council, when called upon by the Executive Council to do so, originals or certified copies of such records, correspondence or minutes referred to above as may be required by the Executive Council;

(iii) operate the college funds jointly with the President or any other member of the Governing Body (other than a teacher, employee or student of the college) as may be authorized by the Governing Body of the college.

Special provision regarding Governing Bodies of certain colleges

Statute 8

(1) (a) In the case of a college established and administered by any Trust or Registered Society or under a scheme laid down by a competent court and already granted affiliation on that stipulation, the Governing Body shall be constituted in accordance with the terms of the memorandum and articles of Association or the Deed of Trust, as the case

Provided that the Governing Body of such a college shall also include the members as envisaged in clauses ©, (d), (e), (f) and (g) of Statute 1 of these Statutes, if not already

(b) Within three months from the date of coming into force of the Statutes under this Chapter, the Governing Body of a college, as envisaged in clause (a), shall be reconstituted

- C Any notice in writing in this behalf shall be sent by the University to the Secretary or the President of the Governing Body of such a college and in that case such notice shall be deemed to have been duly served on the Governing Body of the college.
- (d) If the Governing Body of such a college is not reconstituted within the period referred to in claques (b), the Executive Council may appoint an Administrator to take over the management of the college. The Administrator shall cause reconstitution of the Governing Body of the college within three months from the date of his appointment in accordance with the provisions of clause (a).
- (2) Notwithstanding anything contained in paragraph(1), in the case of a college established and administered by a minority based on religion or language and affiliated to the University under the stipulation as contained in the Memorandum and Articles of Association or the Deed of Trust, as the case may be, the Governing Body of such a college shall be constituted in accordance with the terms of the said Memorandum and Articles of Association or the Deed of Trust, as the cased may be.

Statutes 9

Notwiths and ing anything contained anywhere in this statutes and elsewhere, the Governing Body of a college established or managed by the University, shall be reconstituted by the Principal in accordance with provisions of Statutes 1 with the Vice-Chancellor, University of north Bengal as the Ex-officio-Chairman of the Governing Body, there being no President. The venue of the meeting of the Governing Body shall be such as may be directed by the Vice-Chancellor who shall be the Chairman of the Governing Body. The term of office of the Governing Body of any such college shall be for a period of four years with effect from the date of the first meeting of the Governing Body after its reconstitution. In all other respects the provision of the Statutes 2 to 7 shall apply to such a college.

Interpretation

In this Statutes, unless the context otherwise requires –

(a) "college" means a college affiliated to the University of North Bengal but does

(b) "donor" in relation of any college, means any person or Body or Association which has made to such college a donation of a sum of Rs. 5,000/- or more and who has made over to the college a property valued in the opinion of the Executive Council, at not less than Rs. 5,000/-

ANNUAL REPORT 2003 - 2004

Waiting for me was a myriad of problems when I joined Kalimpong College and took charge of it on 01.07.2002. A Principal is expected to provide leadership as well as administer the institution within a rigid legal framework including precedents and conventions. My endeavour is to try to live up to these expectations without being insensitive to the local contexts and also being adaptive and responsive to the changes that are taking place in the field of education. I believe with the cooperation of staff, teaching and non-teaching along with the students and with the constant support from the University of North Bengal this college is moving towards a take off stage. The problems at the hand however, are at various levels. The involvement of multiple actors belonging to different age groups, sex, socio-economic background which are full of nuances in perception, visions and behaviour present a cobweb of multiple interactions demanding both change and continuity.

I would like to quote Farid Esack (Cross Current, Winter, 2002) "....... we and the way we view ourselves are really ever changing. The truth is that there is neither stable self nor a stable other. Every encounter of the self with the other contributes to the process of ongoing transformation. When we deal with students we are dealing essentially with persons who (like ourselves) are really carriers of the multiple and everchanging souls".

As already mentioned in the forgoing I sincerely believe that we are on the track towards a take off stage. We have made profound progress in our main mission of providing quality higher education with our meager resources. Let me here mention the system of seminars and tutorials introduced from the last year in which students prepare and present papers with the help of the teachers. Students have begun to take promotion tests, selection tests and class tests more seriously. As a result, they have performed better in the final examinations. The number of students who appeared the final examination and passed in 2003 are as follows:

Due to the cooperation and efforts of the office staff the pending audit of the past years has been completed. The audit of the accounts will take place every year from nowor. I am proud to say that the students from Kalimpong College were able to impress the guest participants and resource persons by virtue of their active participation and initiative.

Students' counseling programme was also conducted in different phase throughout the year 2003 and will be continued in future.

The College in collaboration with ERCT is undertaking a Collaborative Research Project on "Man and Environment" in which the following colleges are also participating -

A first ever reunion of the Kalimpong College Alumni was organized in the College Hall on 3rd October, 2003.

If the foregoing presents a brighter side of the story we have in us some of the weaknesses to tell. Despite the improvements in all the fronts we are yet to reach the stage of excellence. The shortage of teaching staff in some of the departments, absence of a separate library building with computerized facilities; and administrative block along with the staff room and a conference room with proper facilities are some of the deficiencies.

The division of the classes in the humanities section into two with a maximum ceiling of 150 students in each section as per the University norms adds to our difficulties.

We need more teachers and class-rooms. The key to the solutions of these problem is obviously sufficient finance, which we certainly lack.

But we are not pessimist; we sincerely believe that with the cooperation of staff, students, the people of Kalimpong and the University of North Bengal we shall achieve out goals of reaching towards excellence in the near future.

ANNUAL REPORT 2004 - 2005

Kalimpong College is gradually graduating towards excellence though not at a desirable pace due to the lack of resources and infrastructures, the socio-economic background of the region of which the college is a part and has to work within the system. The bulk of the students hail from far flung rural areas and socio-economically backward sections.

However, as targeted last year two self-financing courses on Tourism and Travel Management and Communicating / Functional English were introduced from this year. The required facilities are yet to be made available. The college has approached for the grant in aid to the U.G.C. and is eagerly waiting for the response.

Honours in Economics and Pure Science general courses also have been introduced in 2004 and Honours in Geography from 2005. The college intends to introduce some new subjects that are in demand but with the present infrastructure it appears that the college will find difficulties in doing so. A lot depends on the help and support of the Government, Darjeeling Gorkha Hill Autonomous Council and others without which it will be difficult for the college to develop infrastructure. The paucity of fund is always a bolt neck on the road to development. Located in such an economically poor region the college can neither collect high rate of tuition fees nor find a sponsors hailing from big business.

Notwithstanding the constraints the college has engaged itself with academic, extra curricular and some infrastructural developmental activities.

Two new teachers, Dr. Souvik Majumdar and Mr. Pravat Roy joined the department of History in the permanent posts in 2004. The system of organizing students' seminars and tutorials have been continuing. Due to these, a marked improvement is evident in the students performance in the Final Examination This is self explanatory from the following –

Five students from the college participated in the Final Conference of the project in New Delhi held on 27 – 29th January, 2005. Sri Richard Lepcha of Kalimpong College was selected to present the research reports on behalf of these four colleges. The college is proud of him.

The Principal attended the annual conference of the associate member colleges of the Foundation of Academic Excellence and Access in Ahemadabad, Gujrat on 30th and 1st October 2005. A power point presentation on the profile of the college was made in the conference. The Conference discussed various issues relating to Higher Education in India and related issued in the context of the socio-economically deprived sections of the society.

The college in this year have become the associate member of the Foundation of Academic Excellence and Access, New Delhi which has in principle agreed to provide Rs. 5 lace per annum to run the students project on coaching for civil services, examination, students research, language and computer laboratory. The name of three students have been recommended by the college to the Foundation for its scholarship.

The college has applied for FCRA clearance from Home Ministry to be able to avail the grant. These programmes are meant for socio-economically deprived sections of the students.

Our tie up with Education Resource Centre Trust, New Delhi has been fruitful. The students got opportunity to visit different places and participate in the different programmes. The different batches of students attended workshops and similar kind of programmes in Sahayadri College, Chimoga, Karnataka on 27-11-2004, Tehri Dam visit on 17-12-2004.

A U.G.C. sponsored seminar was held on 27-11-2004 on Higher Education and Development Agenda for the 21st Century. Resource persons from the University of North Bengal Dr. Dilip Sarkar, Controller of Examinations, Prof. Jeta Sankritayana, Department of Political Science graced the occasion participated in it.

A students career counseling was organized in collaboration with the College for boys and girls.

The representatives of the Frankfinn Institute of Air Hostess Training put up a career 7th March, 2005.

The students of the college participated in a rally meant for disseminating awareness on HIV/AIDS on the World AIDS DAY organized by World Vision in 2005.

A two days workshop was organized between 17-11-2002 to 19-11-2004 in the college under the collaborative research programme in which students from DAV. College, Deharadun, Sahaydri College, Chimoga, Karnataka and Jaihind College, Dule, Maharastra attended.

The Department of English organized a workshop on Journalism on 31st August, 2004 in the college for students of Elective English which was attended by the students from Cluni Women's College. Mr. Niraj Lama, Mr. Karan Saha of the Statesman and Mr. Reja Pradhan of the Telegraph, the three journalists acted as resource persons.

A U.G.C. National Seminar was held on 28 – 29th March, 2005 on "Indian Writing in English – Themes, Issues and Backgrounds". It was a first of its kind National Seminar organized by the Department of English. Prof. Rukmini Bhaya Nair, Department of English, Indian Institute of Technology, New Delhi, Prof. Anandalal of the Department of English, Jadavpur University and Prof. Aninda Basu of the Department of English, Vidya Sagar University were the main resource persons. Thirty eight college teachers and school teachers from North Bengal and 80 students from Kalimpong College, Cluni Women's College and Salesian College participated and attended the Seminar.

The moment of bliss and glory was experienced by the college when Dr. Prem Poddar Professor of Post Colonial Literature of Aarhus University, an Alumni of the college from the Department of English delivered a lecture on "Borders of Belongings" on 26th July, 2005. The teachers from the college and teachers of Cluni Women's College, students and teachers from the neighbouring schools attended the lecture.

The teachers and students participated in a three day workshop in Colton College, Guwahati on 17th – 19th February, 2005 organised by Education resources Trust, New Delhi and sponsored by Stiffung, a German Foundation. The theme of the workshop was "Democratic Values in Young people".

Five students and one teacher escort attended a workshop organized by Cluster Coordinator, Asutosh Mukherjee College and Presidency College, Kolkata sponsored by Foundation of Academic Excellence and Access between 22nd December to 29th December, 2005.

The college tries to give due importance to extra curricular activities for the all round development of the students. In addition to the seminars, workshops and the

other programmes mentioned in the foregoing the college has organized debates, essay competitions, quizes, table tennis tournaments, football matches for the students in association with Kalimpong College Students' Union Council. The college also participated in outside competition and tournaments. Some of the important events are given the following:

1/ Continuing the glorious tradition, the college football team won the Inter-College Football Competition organized by the University of North Bengal consecutively in 2004 and 2005. In each of the tournament five players were selected to represent the University for the higher level tournaments.

2/ Sushree Mandira Subba and Suraj Subba have brought laurels to the college by bagging second position in the Marathon Race at the district level held in Darjeeling and at the state level in Sikkim in 2004 and 2005.

3/ Sri Dharam Mondal of the college won the Open Men's Double Category and was placed second runners up in the Single Category of the Open Badminton Tournament at the Sub-divisional Level organized by the Alumni Association of the Scottish university Missionary Institution School, Kalimpong in 2005.

Two teachers participated in a workshop on curricular and training in Darjeeling on 2nd and 3rd of December, 2005 organised by this NGO in collaboration with US-AEP/US-AID. The workshop was graced by renowned resource persons and experts from various fields of Ecology and Environment.

The pending tasks of calculating provident fund account has been completed upto 31st March 2005. It was a hurriculan tasks performed and I must thank the office staff, members of Provident Fund Committee and all others involved. The service book of the staff have been kept uptodate. The audit of the account of the college is being regularly done every year.

The books and the laboratory materials have been added this year too. The students' toilet is under construction and will be completed soon. This toilet is being constructed with an estimated cost of Rs. 8,50,000/- from college's own fund.

In fine, one can find a marked improvement in this year in all the segments of the college. Yet, this is not enough, the road towards excellence is a very difficult one. But following college motto if we can develop a mind set that seeks and then finds we can achieve what we want. Whatever little we have achieved is due to the cooperation and teamwork of the dedicated teaching and non-teaching staff, members of Student' Union Council and students in general. ANNEXURE - III

Rules, regulations and guidelines relating to the composition, powers and functions of the various academic and administrative authorities and committees

Rules relating to the Teachers' Council for affiliated Colleges

- In every college there shall be a Teacher' Council. All teachers including the Principal of the college shall be members of the college.
- 2. Unless there is anything repugnant in the subject or context, words and expressions used in this Rules shall have the same meaning as they have in the Act.
- These Rules shall come into force from the date appointed by the Executive Council.
- 4. In every Teachers' Council the Principal of the college concerned shall be the Chairman and shall preside over the meetings of the Teachers' Council. In the absence of the
 - (b) the teacher-in-charge of the College if present, shall act as Chairman and
 - (c) where the teacher-in-charge of the College is also absent, the members present shall elect one of the members to act as Chairman of the meeting.
- 5. In every Teachers' Council their shall be a Secretary who shall be a member of the Council not being the Principal or the teacher-in-charge of the College and shall be elected
- 6. At the commencement of every academic year the Principal of the college shall convene a meeting of the Teachers' Council thereof, after giving at least seven days, notice to the members specifying therein the date, time and place of the meeting for the purpose of
- 7. At the meeting convened under Rule 6 the members of the Teachers' Council shall elect by ballot, one of its members, not being the Principal or teacher-in-charge to act as its secretary. The term of office of the Secretary of the Teachers' Council elected under this paragraph, shall be one year from the date of his election and shall include any period that may elapse between the expiry of the said period of one year and the election of his
- 8. For the purpose of election under Rule 7 the provisions of section 35A of the North Bengal University Act 1981 as amended by the West Bengal University Laws (Amendment

- 9. Meetings of the Teachers' Council shall be convened by the Secretary or in his absence by the Chairman of the Council, on such dates and at such times and places as may be determined by the Chairman after giving at least three days' notice thereof to the members, in case of urgency the Chairman may convene meetings of the Council at a shorter notice. A meeting including a meeting under Rule 6 above shall
- also be convened on requisition in writing by at least one-third of the total number of members of the Council and the date, time and place for such meeting shall be fixed by the Chairman and notified to the members within three days in the manner referred to above.
- 10. The agenda for every meeting of Teachers' Council shall be prepared by the Secretary within the approval of the Chairman or, in his absence, by teacher-in-charge of the college, provide an item, if desired by one-third of the teachers, shall be included in the agenda.
- 11. The Secretary of a Teachers' Council shall prepare and maintain in his custody, the minutes of all meetings of the Council duly signed by the Chairman and the Secretary and every such minutes shall be presented for confirmation at the next meeting of the Council.
- 12. All matters including election of Secretary shall be decided at the meetings of the Teachers' Council by votes of the majority of the members present. In the case of an equality of votes, a decision shall be made by the Chairman by drawing lots.
- 13. For a meeting of a Teachers' Council one-third of the total number of members plus one of the Council shall be quorum.
- 14. The functions and duties of every Teachers' Council shall be to advice the Principal of the college concerned on all academic matters including admission of student, students' welfare, arrangement of time-table, conduct of examinations (including University Examination), improvement of the Library, Laboratories and teaching facilities of the college and expansion and development of the college.

The Principal in his turn shall apprise the governing Body of the proposals initiated by the Teachers' Council.

15. The Principal shall normally act in accordance with the decisions arrived at in the meetings of the teachers' Council. If, however, the Principal is unable to concur with a decision taken by the Teachers' Council, he shall formally ask the Teachers' Council to reconsider its decision. The resolution, if passed by majority of the total number of members of the Teachers' Council present in a meeting of the Teachers' Council called especially for reconsideration of its earlier decision shall be referred by the Principal to the University for a decision.

(This came into force w.e.f. 1.2.87)

Regulations relating to B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. (Part-I, Part-II, Part-III) Three Years (Honours & General Degree Course of Study).

- A student may be admitted to B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. Three Years Degree Course (General/Honours) after passing the Higher Secondary Examination in the general stream conducted by the West Bengal Council of Higher Secondary Education in (10+2) pattern after a period of 12 years study or an examination recognised as equivalent by the University provided he/she has passed in at least five subjects with English as a compulsory subject.
- No candidate shall be allowed to take up any subject in B.Sc. Course if he/she has failed to pass in the corresponding subject(s) at the higher Secondary Examination (10+2) recognized as equivalent by the University.

Provided, however,

- a) a candidate shall be allowed to take up Physics if he/she has passed in Mathematics and Physics at the qualifying examination.
- b) A candidate shall be allowed to take up Botany if he/she has passed in Botany or Biology at the qualifying examination.
- c) A candidate shall be allowed to take up Zoology if he/she has passed in Zoology or Biology at the qualifying examination.
- d) A candidate shall be allowed to take up Computer Science as Honours / General subject if he/she has passed in Mathematics at the qualifying examination.
- e) A candidate shall be allowed to take up Micro-biology if he/she has passed in Chemistry and Biology at the qualifying examination.
- f) A candidate shall be required to take Chemistry as an elective for study in Microbiology Honours.
- a) A candidate shall be allowed to take up Geography if he/she has passed in
 b) A candidate of the passed in
 - b) A candidate shall be allowed to take up Economics as Honours subject if he/she has passed in Mathematics or Business Economics including Business Mathematics at the qualifying examination.
- 4. A candidate shall be allowed to prosecute B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. in General course if he/she has passed the qualifying examinations in vocational stream subject to clause 2
- 5. (a) No candidate shall be allowed to take up more than one of the following as Elective subject save and except a candidate is converted from Honours to General Course:

- (i) English (ii) Bengali (iii) Hindi (iv) Nepali (v) Arabic (vi) Urdu (vii) Modern Tibetan (viii) Sanskrit and (ix) such other subjects as may be introduced by the University from time to time.
 - (b) A candidate prosecuting Honours in a subject, shall not be allowed to study the the same subject ass elective.
- 6. a) Those candidates who would obtain either (i) 45% marks in the aggregate or (ii) 40% in the aggregate with 50% marks in the subject in the qualifying examinations shall be eligible to apply for admission to Honours course in the subject concerned. Admission to a course shall be subject to availability of seats and based on merit.

Provided that for SC/ST candidates, the minimum marks for eligibility shall be (i) 40% marks in the aggregate or (ii) 35% in the aggregate with 50% in the subject for admission to Honours course in the subject concerned.

- b) In the matter of eligibility to apply for admission to Honours courses 44.5% marks or above shall be treated as 45% marks and 49.5% marks or above shall be treated as 50%.
- 7. a) After admission in First Year Degree Classes in the B.A./B.Sc,/B.Com. Part I/II/III) Degree Courses (Honours / General), a student shall have to prosecute a regular course of study for a period of one academic session / year in 1st year Class for being eligible to appear at the B.A./B.Sc,/B.Com. Part I (Honours / General) Examination, another session/year of study in 2nd Year Class (after qualifying in the Part I Examination) for being eligible to appear at the B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. Part II (Honours / General) Examination and finally another session/year of study in 3rd Year Class (after qualifying in the Part II examination) for being eligible to appear at the B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. Part III (Honours / General) Examination.

A regular course of study shall mean attendance in at least 75% of the classes actually held in the session/year.

- b) In case of admission on transfer, which shall not be permitted other than in First Year of Degree Classes (Honours & General), a student must offer the same subjects as he/she studied in the previous college.
 - a) In order to pass the B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. (General) Examination, a candidate shall be required to obtain 34% marks in each of the Compulsory and Elective subjects (30% marks in theoretical and 40% marks in practical separately in laboratory based subjects) in the Part – I, Part – II and Part – III University Examinations taken together.

- b) A candidate securing at least 34% marks in Compulsory and 30% marks in Elective subjects (30% marks in theoretical and 40% marks in practical separately in laboratory based subjects) at the Part-I Examination shall be given 'QG-II' to imply that the candidate has qualified for prosecuting studies in the following academic year in Part II (Second Year Class). Similarly, a candidate securing at least 34% marks in compulsory and 30% marks in Elective subjects (30% marks in theoretical and 40% marks in practical separately in laboratory-based subjects) at the Part II Examination shall be given 'QG-III' to imply that the candidate has qualified for prosecuting studies in the following academic year in Part III (Third Year Class).
- c) A student shall have to offer the following subjects at the B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. (General) Part I Examination:
 - i) One comp0ulsory paper of any one of the following languages carrying 50 marks; Bengali, Hindi, Nepali, Urdu, Alternative English, Lepcha, Limboo, Bhutia, Modern Tibetan.
 - Three elective subjects each carrying 150 marks (both theory and ii) practical papers, wherever relevant) consisting of three halves/papers.
- d) A student shall have to offer the following subjects at the B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. (General) Part II Examination :
 - i) One compulsory paper of English carrying 50 marks. ii)
 - Corresponding three elective subjects of Part I Examination each carrying 150 marks consisting of three halves/papers.
- e) A student shall have to offer the following subjects at the B.A./B.Sc./B.Com (General) Part III Examination :
 - One compulsory paper of Environmental Studies carrying 50 marks. ii)
 - Corresponding three elective subjects of Part II Examination carrying
 - g) Part I (500 marks) Part II (500 marks) and Part III (350 marks) altogether shall carry 1350 marks for B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. General Three Years Degree Course

- g) B.A./B.Com. (Hons.) Part I Examination shall consist of the following papers :
 - Elective subjects each carrying 150 marks consisting of three halves/papers.
 - (ii) One compulsory paper of any one of the following languages carrying 50 marks: Bengali, Hindi, Nepali, Urdu, Alternative English, Lepcha, Limboo, Bhutia.
 - (iii) One Honours subject of 200 marks consisting of two Theory / Practical papers.
- h) B.Sc. Honours Part I Examination shall consist of the following papers :
 - Elective subjects each carrying 150 marks consisting of three halves/papers.
 - (ii) One compulsory paper of any one of the following languages carrying 50 marks: Bengali, Hindi, Nepali, Urdu, Alternative English, Lepcha, Limboo, Bhutia.
 - (iii) One Honours subject of marks to be decided by the Council for Under Graduate Studies and notified by the University.
- i) B.A./B.Com. (Hons.) Part II Examination shall consist of the following papers:
 - Elective subjects corresponding of Part I Examination each carrying 150 marks consisti8ng of three halves/papers.
 - One compulsory paper of English language carrying 50 marks.
 - One Honours subject of 200 marks corresponding of consisting of theory and practical papers.
- j) B.Sc. Honours Part II Examination shall consist of the following papers:
 - Elective subjects each carrying 150 marks consisting of three halves/papers.
 - One compulsory paper of any one of the following languages carrying 50 marks: Bengali, Hindi, Nepali, Urdu, Alternative English, Lepcha, Limboo, Bhutia.
 - One Honours subject of marks to be decided by the Council for Under Graduate Studies and notified by the University.
- k) A student shall have to offer the following subjects at the B.A./B.Com. (Hons.) Part III Examination :

- One compulsory paper of Environmental Studies carrying 50 marks.
- One Honours subject corresponding to Part II Examination of 400 marks consisting of theoretical/practical papers.

I) B.Sc. Honours Part III Examination shall consist of the following papers :

- Elective subjects each carrying 150 marks consisting of three halves/papers.
- One compulsory paper of any one of the follo9wing languages carrying 50 marks: Bengali, Hindi, Nepali, Urdu, Alternative English, Lepcha, Limboo, Bhutia.
- One Honours subject of marks to be decided by the Council for Under Graduate Studies and notified by the University.
- m) Part I (550 marks); Part II (550 marks) and Part III (450 marks) altogether shall carry 1550 marks for B.A./B.Com. Hons. Three Year Degree Course Examination.
- n) Marks of Part I / II / III shall be decided by the Council for Under Graduate Studies and notified by the University.
- 9. a) A candidate securing minimum 30% marks but less than 34% marks in aggregate in the Honours theoretical papers and 40% marks in practical papers in laboratory-based subjects with pass marks in the elective subjects in Part I Examination shall be qualified to appear at the Part II General Examination as QG candidate, subject to application submitted by the candidate to the University through the Principal of the College concerned.
- b) A candidate securing not less than 34% marks in Honours papers (34% marks in theoretical and 40% marks in the Practical separately in laboratory-based subjects) of the Part I Examination (at the end of First Year Degree Class) and pass marks in elective subjects shall be awarded 'QH/II' to imply that he/she has qualified for prosecuting studies the Part II Examination, a candidate securing not less than 34% marks (34% marks in Honours papers of part II Examination and pass marks in Laboratory-base subjects) in the 'QH/III' to imply that he/she has qualified for prosecuting studies in the following academic year in Part III Examination (Third Year Class).

- c) However, student securing "QH-II" or "QH-III" may again appear in the immediately following Part I or Part II (Honours) Examination as casual candidate without attending classes. For this he/she shall have to surrender the mark-sheet to the University through the Principal within 30 working days from the date of receipt of the same.
- d) A candidate who has failed in only the compulsory subject in the Part I Honours Examination, shall be awarded XQH and he/she shall be eligible to clear that subject in the immediately following Part II Honours examination.
- e) A candidate who has failed in only the compulsory subject in the Part II Honours Examination, shall be awarded XQH and he/she shall be eligible to clear that subject in the immediately following Part II Honours examination.
- 10. In order to pass the B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. (Honours) Examinations, a candidate must obtain 40% marks in aggregate at the Part-I, Part-II and Part-III Examination taken together in the Honours subject (34% marks in the theoretical papers and 40% marks in practical papers separately in laboratory-based subjects in each Part) and pass marks in the elective subjects and compulsory subjects in each :Part. Candidates securing minimum 30% but less than 40% in theoretical papers taking together the theoretical marks of all Parts I, II and III and 40% in practical papers in Honours subject and 34% in general / elective subjects shall be declared as General Course Graduates with the indication of 'P' in the Mark-sheet. For this the candidates shall be required to apply through the Principal within six months from the date of publication of re-assessed result.
 - a) Honours / General course candidates securing 40% or more marks in the practical papers need not appear at the practical examinations of the same standard again.
 - b) A candidate who fails to qualify in Part I General Examination in only one elective subject/group shall have the option to clear that subject/group in the immediately following examination. The result shall be declared as "XQ" and such a candidate shall be promoted to the part II class. Candidates who fail to qualify in the immediately following shall be reverted to the second year class for prosecuting regular course for another session/year
 - c) A candidates who fails to qualify in Part II General Examination in only one elective subject / group shall have the option to clear that subject/group in the immediately following examination. The result shall be declared as "XQ" and such a candidate shall be promoted to the Part III Class. Candidates who fail to qualify in the immediately following shall be reverted to the third year class for prosecuting course for another year/session.

- 12. A candidate securing at least 60% marks in aggregate in B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. (General) Part I, Part II and Part III examinations taken together shall be awarded First Division. A candidate securing 45% or above but less than 60% marks in aggregate shall be awarded Second Division. A candidate securing an aggregate less than 45% but above 34% shall be declare to have passed the examination in the "P:" Division.
- 13. a) Honours candidates shall be awarded First Class if they secure at least 60% marks in the aggregate in the Honours subjects in Part I, Part II and Part III examinations taken together. They shall be placed in the second Class if the aggregate is 40% or above but less than 60%.
- b) Students securing 60% marks or above in the elective subjects in addition to First Class or Second Class marks in the Honours subject shall be declared to have passed Honours with Distinction.
- c) The Council for Undergraduate Studies concerned shall frame rules relating to internal tests to be taken by the College.
- 14. A candidate who took up Honours in a subject may be allowed by the college authorities to revert to General Course with that subject as elective if the candidate submits application to the Principal to this effect before enrolment for the Part I examination. His/her attendance in Honours classes shall count towards that in the general classes in the subject.
- 15. i) If a student after completion of a regular course or study for Part I / II / III B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. General/Honours examination enrolls for the Part I / II / III examination but fails to appear in the said examination or appears in the said examination but fails to pass, he/she shall be eligible to appear to any one or if necessary both of the following examinations of the same standard as a casual candidate without attending classes on payment of prescribed fees.
- ii) If a candidate fails to appear in all the Honours papers (theoretical and practical) at the Part III examination on account of illness or any other reason considered sufficient by the University, he/she shall be required to prosecute a fresh course of study in the 3rd year class and appear again at the entire Part III examination in any one or, if necessary, both of the two following years as a casual candidate.
- iii) If a student completes regular course of study for B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. Part I / II / III General/Honours examination but fails in the college Test or for any other reason fails to enroll himself/herself for the Part I / II / III examination, he/she shall be required to take resuch re-admission shall be allowed.

- 16. i) If a candidate appearing in Honours Part I / II examination either fails to appear in all the Honours/elective/compulsory papers for any reason whatsoever or having appeared in the elective/compulsory subjects along with the Honours papers, fails to pass in more than one of the elective subjects/groups, he shall have to appear at the part I / Part II examination in all subjects including the Honours subjects at any one or, if necessary, both of two following examinations of Part I / II.
- ii) Honours candidates who fail in only one elective subject/group in Part I / II examination shall be eligible to clears that subject/group as a back paper at the immediately following Part I / II (Honours) examination.
- iii) A candidate who fails only in "Environmental Studies" compulsory subject in Part III General / Honours examination shall be eligible to clear the said subject as a back paper at the immediately following Part III examination and shall have to clear the back paper with only one chance.
- All examination shall be conducted by means of printed question papers.
- 18. The theoretical papers of Honours carrying 100 marks shall be of four hours duration. Other theoretical papers of elective subjects carrying 100 marks shall be of three hours duration. Compulsory papers carrying 50 marks shall of two hours duration.
- Every student shall have to attend at least 75% of the classes actually held in a year/session to sit for any University examination Part I / II / III.
- All answer scripts of Undergraduate examinations shall be disposed by the University on expiry of two months from the date of publication of re-assessment/scrutiny of the respective examinations.
- In case of any difficulty in implementation of these Regulations, the Vice-Chancellor shall have the power to issue directions and clarifications in consonance with the Act/Statutes/Ordinance of the university.

ANNEXURE - VII

Master Plan of the Institution

Kalimpong College was established over 40 years ago, in 1962. Since it did not have land of its own the college shifted places as many as four times firstly at B.T. College in two small rooms, then at Hill Top, Kalimpong, then at 11th mile, Top Khana and finally at the present site on a portion of land belonging to the Forest Department at the Bankim Chandra Park which was transferred to the Kalimpong College in the year 1978. The Kalimpong College was shifted to its new building in 1982. The construction of additional building was started in 1993. It is interesting to note that in the beginning Kalimpong College offered Degree Course in Humanities. Subsequently, B.Com. was introduced in 1971 and B.Sc. in 1973.

The land area available for the Kalimpong College at present is a meager 1.760 acres as follows:

New area towards the north-eastern slopes below:

Plot No. 7972	0.195 acres

Kalimpong College is still the only multi-curricula College in the entire Kalimpong Subdivision. The Kalimpong College Board has been planning to introduce many more modern subjects in order to keep pace with and suited to the multifarious educational and vocational requirements of a fast changing world.

However, hardly any new construction works have been taken up by the college after 1993, except a construction of a students toilet in 2004, as a result of which there is extreme shortage of classroom, Laboratory, Library, Teachers' Room and Administrative Office space in the Kalimpong College

Unemployment problem in the hill areas of Darjeeling District is fast reaching unmanageable proportions and the Kalimpong College will have to play a leading role to arm the students of the District with suitable educational qualifications and training to enable them to face the world with a high level of confidence and competitive spirit. However, in order to fulfill this dream, complete overhauling and streamlining of the existing infrastructure of the College needs to be taken up without delay. Time is ripe to steps to ensure that the construction of new buildings and other infrastructure synchronizes perfectly with the projected requirements.

THE MASTER-PLAN:

Since its establishment in 1962, the Kalimpong College has made a long and painful journey. Nevertheless, the student population has increased from a mere 28 students at the start to a massive 1540 students (811 male and 729 female) at present. There is tremendous shortage of built-up space and the Main Building and Science Block now houses all the different departments, Administration, Teachers' Common Rooms, Library, Toilets and everything. Classrooms are occupied by the different Departments in shifts. The College does not have student hostels of its own. To make matters worse, the College has very limited resources of its own to initiate new development works or carry out maintenance. It is in this context that the Governing Body has embarked on the splendid idea of preparation of a Master Plan.

However, the College site has some advantages too. It is located at a convenient walking distance of only 1 kilometer from Kalimpong Town. It also has two very good approach roads, one at the northern and the other at the southern extremity of the plot, which provide excellent connectivity to the adjoining major roads.

The Conceptual Master Plan envisages the following Goals and Objectives:

- Adopt a central strategy for turning the Kalimpong College Campus into a vibrant Knowledge Centre with excellent and acceptable physical environment.
- Cause and Effect are directly related. Taking this concept in view, identify the causes
 of various problems besetting the College and find correct and viable solutions oriented
 towards an image of the larger student and public welfare.
- 3. The problem of land availability and cost is a serious one. The College has only 1.760 acres of land at present. While efforts must be made to add some more land from the adjacent areas, it is doubtful if the Forest Department will part with any more land from the Bankim Chandra Park as this will entail environmental issues. The College has started fencing out the boundary to stop illegal encroachments. But more work needs to be done, especially towards the north and north-west.
- 4. Segregate the different Departments and Sections as far as possible to improve efficiency in the day to day running of the College. To do this, certain vacant areas within the campus have been selected and focused upon for comprehensive treatment in accordance with detailed plans which can bee modified in due course. Master Plans are like overall system design. So accordingly, the Kalimpong College Master Plan has been drawn to a particular scale showing areas zoned as primarily suited for specific purposes satisfying a wide array of competing curriculum. Due to small land area and limited lateral expansion possibilities on hilly site slopes, a vertical expansion and multistoried physical profile of buildings has been adopted perforce.

The following tentative floor areas have been provided in the different new blocks suggested

a) Administrative Block	5,300 sft.
b) Library Block	
c) Commerce Block	
d) Toilet Block	3,500 sft. (under construction)

However, given the ever increasing variety of subjects and curricula, the different departments must show a willingness between them to co-operate in classroom sharing in the interest of the students.

- Sufficiently large areas of green spaces have been provided inside the campus which must be tastefully landscaped and beautified. An Indoor Stadium is also recommended.
- 6. An good circulation plan has been attempted within the campus to connect the different building blocks. However, no vehicular traffic will be allowed inside the core area as they will be a source of noise disturbance. Vehicular traffic will be allowed only in the fringe areas.
- 7. Educational Infrastructure has high order of impact in the lives of people. So the main goal and objective should be to turn out more and more bright students from Kalimpong College, year after year. Development must not be merely procedure oriented it must be aggressive. Attitudes must change from negative to positive! This is the only way to stimulate interest amongst teachers, students and staff of the College.

- © In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the said accounts read with notes thereon, if any give a true and fair view:-
 - (i) in the case of balance sheet, of the state of the affairs as at 31st March 2003, and
 - (ii) in the case of the Income and expenditure account, of the excess of income over Expenditure for the year ended on that date.

Observation/Suggestion:

 Equipment are being received from District Magistrate fund but are not reflected in books, as no official document regarding the same is given to the college. I will suggest that the above equipment should be included in the books by showing asset on one side and DM fund on the liability side.

- 2) Similarly a building of worth Rs. Seven lacs and fifty thousand has been constructed by the M.P. Fund but is not reflected in the books for the same reason. Another Building worth of Rs. Seven Lacs and Fifty Thousand is under construction. I will suggest to include this building in the books in the same manner as stated above.
- 3) Rs. One Lacs is receivable from Ambition Computers, a franchise of Aptech. This has been not included in the books as explained to me that the amount is disputable and the college has retained possession of some computers of Ambition Computers for the above reason. I will suggest that to include the above amount as receivable on the asset side.
- 4) Bank has excess credited college account no 3A/338 by Rs. One Lacs in around year 2000. The college has not reflected the same in the books.
- 5) There are many items in the balance sheet, which are lying from several years but have no actual existence. As suggested by earlier auditor I will also like to suggest that after getting approval from the governing body the college should set off or write-off those balances.

- (b) In our opinion, proper books of accounts have been kept, so far as appears from our examinations of books.
- In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the said accounts read with notes thereon, if any give a true and fair view:-
 - (i) in the case of balance sheet, of the state of the affairs as at 31st March 2004, and
 - (ii) in the case of the Income and expenditure account, of the excess of income over Expenditure for the year ended on that date.

Observation/Suggestion:

- Equipment are being received from District Magistrate fund but are not reflected in books, as no official document regarding the same is given to the college. I will suggest that the above equipment should be included in the books by showing asset on one side and DM fund on the liability side.
- 2) Similarly a building of worth Rs. Seven lacs and fifty thousand has been constructed by the M.P. Fund but is not reflected in the books for the same reason. Another Building worth of Rs. Seven Lacs and Fifty Thousand is under construction. I will suggest to include this building in the books in the same manner as stated above.

- 3) Rs. One Lacs is receivable from Ambition Computers, a franchise of Aptech. This has been not included in the books as explained to me that the amount is disputable and the college has retained possession of some computers of Ambition Computers for the above reason. I will suggest that to include the above amount as receivable on the asset side.
- 4) Bank has excess credited college account no 3A/338 by Rs. One Lacs in around year 2000. The college has not reflected the same in the books.
- 5) There are many items in the balance sheet, which are lying from several years but have no actual existence. As suggested by earlier auditor I will also like to suggest that after getting approval from the governing body the college should set off or write-off those balances.
